
2nd and 3rd Graders Get Their Bearings Through Geocaching



What is a geocache exactly? Geocaching is an outdoor recreational activity that makes use of a Global Positioning System (GPS) device or application that pinpoints coordinates to help hide and/ or seek containers, called "geocaches" or "caches", at specific locations. These locations can be marked by coordinates all over the world. A cache is usually a small waterproof container containing a logbook and sometimes a pen or pencil. The geocacher signs the log and dates it, in order to prove that they found



the cache. After signing the log, the cache must be placed back exactly where the person found it. You can imagine how excited our students must have been to learn that there are caches right here in Bolton!

Local Science Lessons Head Outdoors!

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

Students in Studio Art practiced observation drawing using their own shoes. After creating contour line drawings, students were asked to consider how color can create movement in an art piece. Studio Art students worked mainly with watercolor paint for this project.










First Grade students studied root vegetables and how they grow underground! Students then created a detailed painting highlighting the parts of a root vegetable to gain a further understanding of color and form. Working with tempera paint allowed our artists to produce vivid colors in their art pieces.







Students in Second and Third Grade researched ant colonies as part of a science lesson. After discovering how ants set up their colonies and how artists can be inspired by the complexity of the colonies, students were asked to create their own whimsical creation. Colored pencil was the medium that allowed these students the most flexibility.
