QR Code?

You may have noticed that we have started using more QR Codes in our newsletter. There are so many exciting things going on with our students, not only the stories and the photos! Things like video clips and whole performances are now available for families and our community to enjoy! The easiest way to let you know about all this additional content is with a OR Code.

QR stands for Quick Response. The image consists of square dots in a unique configuration that provides information for the user. QR Codes can contain text, links (to web sites, videos, files), and much more.

Here's how you use (scan) a QR Code:

Open the camera app.

Focus the camera on the QR code by gently tapping the code.

Follow the instructions on the screen to complete the action.

Local employers are desperate for student graduates with training in a number of high-paying fields in the trades. Less than 3.4% of construction trade workers are women, according to research conducted by the Institute for Women's Policy Research, 2018 report. That number is comparable with other skilled trades when it comes to percent of women. WSWHE BOCES is focused on narrowing this skills gap.

Introduction to Occupations~ An Eye on Manufacturing



At Bolton CSD, Introduction to Occupations is a required course for our 9th grade students that provides a solid foundation of the career exploration process. This year students had the opportunity to participate in a Manufacturing and STEAM Day event at SUNY Adirondack, in partnership with Washington, Saratoga, Warren, Hamilton, and Essex (WSWHE) BOCES.

This two-part event allowed students to spend several hours touring a manufacturing facility first-hand and then attend a convention style event with hands-on activities, demonstrations and networking opportunities from such companies as Adirondack Studios, Barton Mines Company, Finch Paper and Global Foundries, just to name a few.

Our students were able to tour RASP Inc., established in 1995 and located in Gansevoort. RASP is an industrial controls manufacturer which focuses on delivering industrial control projects in a timely manner while maintaining quality. Not only did students tour the entire facility, they were given insight on how some of the technological activities they may enjoy doing could become a career in manufacturing if they were interested. Students also gained a valuable understanding of a safe and productive work environment and how this particular company was able to keep their business viable during the pandemic by being able to diversify the projects they create.

Thanks to the initiative of our educators, students have access to opportunities that could lead to a career and also learn more about the industries in their local area. Building these types of connections, even if it just amounts to a better understanding of how the world around us works, is a valuable eye on the future!











Matriarch Tree Makes It to Bolton~ Teaching Skills and Patience



All Bolton CSD students have access, and are encouraged to participate in, a wide variety of technology and engineering options. These options expose students to systems of all kinds; from Drawing and Design for Production, Creativity and Innovation, to Production Systems involving Energy, Transportation and Construction.

8th and 9th graders are also provided with a varied cross section of experiences to help them realize where

their interests and aptitudes may be strongest. This fall, students worked on crafting wooden spoons by hand. The choosing of the wood, selecting a style, working with tools to achieve the basic shape, and then the sanding and finish work were tasks students learned as they completed the project.



During this time a member of our staff made Technology teacher, Mr. Pat Boire aware of a news article that talked about an approximately 200 year old "wolf tree" sugar maple that was being prepared for special projects.

As a shorter trunked sugar maple, this tree was better suited for woodworking projects. The high-quality wood was offered to those who could turn it into wooden spoons, walking sticks or bowls.

Mr. Boire reached out to the individual who had taken on the responsibility of making sure this tree (affectionately named "Mabelle") went into the future as something other than fire wood. Once the wood was at BCS, students went to work with their acquired skills and produced spoons to be auctioned off, with proceeds going to Woodlands Cemetery (where the tree had been located) for an as-of-yet-unnamed project.



The skill and patience that are needed to produce any kind of fine woodworking project is an attribute that can be applied to any task one wishes to do well with. These experiences create life-long learners at Bolton CSD.

My favorite vacation was New Orleans. We got to go in the ocean, play in the sand and make sandcastles.


Do you have a favorite book, movie or TV show?

Bianca Braman attended K-12 at BCS and graduated in 2009. She attended Potsdam University where she received a Bachelors in Speech Communications and Literature. She spent many years as a restaurant manager and event planner before rediscovering her love for working outdoors. She now works as a commercial beekeeper for French Hill Apiaries in St. Albans, is one-third owner and operator of Vermont Bees LLC, and is a part time ski patroller at Jay Peak in Vermont. Bianca is continuing her education in a program through Pennsylvania State University learning to produce queen bees and start a breeding program.

What expectations did you have for your future when you graduated from BCS?

When I graduated from BCS I wanted to get my bachelors, then masters, maybe PhD and eventually work as a teacher or counselor. I had no idea that I would get into agriculture or have my own business. I've learned that almost everything changes with time.


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
Students in Studio Art 9 were asked to create a continuous contour line self portrait inspired by the work of artist Frank Big Bear. They explored pattern making and the use of vibrant colors. Students were encouraged to use contrast to create movement across the page.

In STEAM -A is for ART!





Students in Art 5 created radial symmetry using a printmaking process called collagraphy. Students created their own printing plates using cardboard and craft foam. They then designed a paper reinforcing a radial design. Using radial symmetry they then printed the plate creating the effect.





In AP 2D Design, students were given the prompt "Family through any number of years." This composition was created keeping the elements and principle of design in mind. This student chose to create their piece using watercolor.
