

CLASS TIME SCHEDULE





YOUR CONSTANT CONNECTION TO BOLTON CENTRAL SCHOOL!

Our website has a new look. If you haven't visited it in awhile, please check it out at www.boltoncsd.org. No matter where you are or what day or time it is, if you have access to the Internet, you have constant access to BCS. Through our school website, you are able to link to a variety of informative and interesting facets of the school. Staying informed about the latest news, educational programs and district information is just a "click" away.

Most important to parents of BCS students is POWERSCHOOL. Through a partnership with the Pearson Corporation, Bolton Central School became the first school in the North Country to be designated as a PowerSchool. This innovative program, again using Internet access from any computer, allows parents instant information, including grades, attendance, assignment and test information. This information is available for review 24 hours a day, 7 days a week throughout the school year.

BCS students and parents will receive coded passwords, which will allow access to the information that each teacher enters pertaining to them. In cumulative fashion, PowerSchool lists all courses enrolled in, the assignments and tests, the grades and value to the overall class grade and grade point averages. It also is a great way to ensure that all assignments have been satisfactorily completed. In short, it's an electronic grade book and class register, which you can look at any time that you want.

Common Core State Standards

The Common Core State Standards provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to learn, so teachers and parents know what they need to do to help them. These standards are designed to be robust and relevant to the current world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our students need for success in college and careers.

The Standards set requirements not only for English language arts (ELA) but also for literacy in Social Studies, Science, Mathematics and associated subjects. Just as students must learn to read, write, speak, listen, and use language effectively in a variety of content areas, so too must the Standards specify the literacy skills and understandings required for college and career readiness in multiple disciplines. Literacy standards for grade 6 and above are predicated on teachers of ELA, history/social studies, science, and technical subjects using their content area expertise to help students


meet the particular challenges of reading, writing, speaking, listening, and language in their respective fields. It is important to note that the 6-12 literacy standards in social studies. science, and technical subjects are not meant to replace existing content standards in those areas but rather to supplement them. New York State and Bolton Central School is incorporating these standards into these subjects and has adopted them as content area literacy standards. As a natural outgrowth of meeting the charge to define college and career readiness, the Common Core Standards also lay out a vision of what it means to be a literate person in the 21st century. Indeed, the skills and understandings students are expected to demonstrate have wide applicability outside the classroom or workplace. Students who exceed the Common Core Standards readily undertake the close, attentive reading that is at the heart of understanding and enjoying challenging work. They habitually

perform the critical reading necessary to pick carefully through the staggering amount of information available today in print and digitally and actively seek the wide, deep, and thoughtful engagement with high-quality informational texts that builds knowledge, enlarges experience, and broadens worldviews. They reflexively demonstrate the cogent reasoning and use of evidence that is essential to both private deliberation and responsible citizenship in a democratic republic.

In short, students who exceed the Standards develop the skills in reading, writing, speaking, and listening that are the foundation for any creative and purposeful expression. The Bolton Central School District believes that this better prepares our students for success after graduation. The Common Core Standards will be implemented fully and endorsed across our entire curriculum in the years to come.

RULES FOR ATTENDING ATHLETIC CONTESTS

Please follow these rules:

1. At all athletic contests, coaches and advisors will be in charge of cheerleaders and players.

2. Chaperones from both home and visiting schools attending the activity will have full charge of spectators.

3. Visiting teams, spectators and referees are guests. Sportsmanlike conduct will be the responsibility of each member of the faculty, student body, and Bolton fans.

4. Students are not to leave their seats except between games and at halftime.

5. Students attending from Grade 6 or below must be accompanied by a parent (or adult) and remain with that parent (or adult) during the game (a student is not considered an adult for the purpose of this rule).

6. Refreshments will be served and consumed in the cafeteria at the following times: pregame, halftime, and intermission between games.

7. Smoking is strictly prohibited on school property.

8. Only those in uniform will be allowed on the playing surface at any time. Spectators are asked to avoid this area entirely. 9. Students are not allowed to leave the building and then reenter without prior permission. Once a student leaves the building, he/she may not be permitted to return.

10. Only players, coaches and managers will be allowed in the locker rooms. Others found there will be directed to leave.

11. Students and spectators will have access to bathrooms on the first floor only. These are located in the hallway adjacent to the gym.

12. Cordial host behavior is a reflection on Bolton Central School.

13. Spectators are not to be in the building outside the gymnasium area.

14. Spectators are to be seated and not stand in doorways.

It is important that we maintain our reputation as good hosts, good sports, and good spectators. No booing at any time. When foul shots are taken by any team, silence is the policy.

If a visiting teams' players or spectators conduct themselves poorly, exert every effort to maintain a calm and cool manner. We have chaperones at basketball games, who constantly remind the crowd of the need to be good sports, but they cannot do it alone. All of us become part of the process.

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY RULES & PROCEDURES

The most important element of school bus transportation is the safety of students. In order to achieve a safe and efficient system, drivers must have the cooperation of all student riders.

1. Conduct on the school bus shall be of the same high standard as expected in the classroom. All school rules apply while students are on the bus. Students shall be courteous to fellow riders and their bus driver. Such acts as fighting, pushing, obscene talk or gestures will not be tolerated and will be cause for disciplinary action.

2. In order to maintain a strict time schedule, drivers cannot wait for students. Students must be ready and on time for boarding the bus each morning. PLEASE BE READY!

3. Students shall wait until the bus comes to a full stop before entering the roadway to board the bus or before leaving their seat to get off the bus.

4. Students should use extreme caution when getting on or off the bus. When crossing the highway, wait for the driver to signal to do so and cross 10 feet from the front of the bus.

5. Students shall always take a seat upon boarding a bus and remain seated at all times while the bus is in motion. If a seat is not available, students should hold on to the back of a seat with both hands and face forward. 6. Students are to keep arms and heads inside of the bus at all times. Bus windows shall be kept shut unless permission to open them is given by the driver.

7. Smoking or the use of tobacco by students on the bus is strictly prohibited at all times. Eating of food, drinking of beverages, and taking medication is not permitted on the bus.

8. All items considered to be dangerous objects are prohibited on the bus. Also, bulky items, pets and animals should not be brought on the bus unless with permission granted ahead of time.

9. Buses must be kept clean at all times. Each student has the duty and responsibility to see that he or she does not litter.

10. Students shall remain on the bus until it arrives at school or at home. Drivers will not let students off upon request unless a pass is obtained from the Main Office for a change in riding status and given to the driver. A written parental request is required for any change from one bus to another or for a change in pick-up or drop-off point. Allowing for sufficient time to effect these changes ensures student safety.

11. The school bus driver is completely in charge when transporting students. All instructions given shall be followed and students should cooperate with the driver in any way they can. These rules are made for the safety and benefit of all students. Unfortunately, there may be students who will not or do not abide by the rules. In the event of violations, the following disciplinary steps have been established:

A. Verbal warning by the Bus Driver.

B. Written referral to the principal for possible disciplinary action or suspension, with parental notification.

C.Parent conference with school administrator in order to determine eligibility for continued transportation.

D. School authorities may remove a student from bus privileges at any time if the offense is serious enough to warrant such action, regardless of the number of violations.

E. Exclusive of the verbal warnings, parents will be notified of bus incidents and violations.

To assure bus safety, the New York State Education Department requires three school bus drills during each school year. The drills involve instruction as to the methods of exit from the bus in case of accident, location and use of fire extinguishers, and location of first aid kits.

Other safety factors such as crossing roadways, seating, behavior, as well as boarding and exiting exercises are reviewed and conducted.

Bolton Central School offers breakfast to all students. Breakfast is served each school day beginning at 7:45 a.m. Cost is \$1.75. All menu items meet or exceed nutritional guidelines as determined by NYS and Federal Programs. Reduced breakfast price 25¢.

SCHOOL LUNCH

Bolton Central School serves nutritionally complete lunches every school day. In addition to a complete lunch, students may purchase any part of the lunch on an a-la-carte basis. Regular lunch may be purchased for \$2.25. Additional milk may also be purchased separately for 50¢.


