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More Tests Given


As with everything, you have to start somewhere.

When it comes to student achievement, it's important to know what level students are performing at before it can be established how much they've improved.

Establishing benchmarks of student achievement in the fall, winter and spring provides data that drives instruction and indicates where extra help is needed. Data-driven instruction is a component of the Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR), which is explained on page 2.

To establish those benchmarks, schools have been using a variety of standardized tests in addition to the state assessments.

"At Bolton Central School, we've added more tests to pinpoint more accurate data," explained Mrs. Michelle Borgh, K-7 guidance



counselor.

This year, BCS has added the TerraNova, a series of standardized achievement tests to assess student achievement in English language arts and Math to students in grades K-3. "We administered the TerraNovas

over a two-day period in October," said Mrs. Borgh, "and we will give them again in May to students in kindergarten, first and second grades. Third graders will take the state assessments, so they won't need to

take the Terra Nova test."

Over the past two years, K-8 students had already been taking assessments in reading through AIMSweb, a web-based data management system that measures progress and expands teachers' assessment time. This year, Math is being added.



AIMSweb uses a three-tiered approach of establishing a benchmark by assessing students three times a year, monitoring at-risk students

monthly and evaluating the effectiveness of instruction, and thirdly, writing individualized goals and monitoring those who need more intensive instruction.

What exactly is APPR?

If you're an educator or know any teachers or principals, then you've heard the acronym APPR. It's what's on all New York educators' minds and consuming their time.

APPR is the Annual Professional Performance Review plan for teachers and principals.

Based on regulations from the New York State Education Department, the new way to evaluate teachers includes an observation system that determines if the teacher is highly effective, effective, developing, or ineffective. It includes multiple observations including one unannounced observation. More observations will be scheduled for new or ineffective teachers.

Observations are only a part of the APPR. The evaluation is comprised of four areas each weighing in at a certain percentage.

The largest percentage, 60 percent, will encompass the teacher's planning and preparation in the classroom, the classroom environment, instruction, and professional responsibility. A total of 20 percent will be based on student achievement, such as state tests. Locally developed assessments or

Student Learning Objectives (SLOs), a point-based system depicting student growth, will account for 15 percent. The final 5 percent is an assessment model that measures student growth.

Data needs to be collected to show where the student is starting from in order to measure student growth. Therefore, pre-and post-tests have been incorporated. (See article on More Tests Given on front page.) The data derived from those tests will determine how and what to teach that student. This is referred to as Data-Driven Instruction (**DDI**).

This shift in teaching and evaluating arose from the Race to the Top (**RTTT**) grant, which was a federal grant that the states applied for. New York State applied and received the grant that dispersed funds to all school districts in the state. In the WSWHE BOCES region, the 31 school districts pooled those funds.

As part of RTTT, the state adopted new learning standards called the Common Core Learning Standards, (**CCLS**) the new assessments (**SLOs**) and evaluation system (**APPR**).

More iPads Added

Creating virtual field trips, researching Meso American civilizations, and learning the alphabet, are just a few of the ways that Bolton Central School teachers are using iPads with their students.

By the second semester, all BCS students will have access to an iPad. A total of 206 of the handheld tablets designed by Apple Inc. have been purchased.

The three-phase integration of the iPads into instruction began last September. The plan included installing a wireless infrastructure

Standards and 21st Century Learning Skills, the iPad enhances instruction in several ways.

"Students have instant access to research without leaving the classroom," said Mrs. Trowbridge. "There are countless educational applications available that complement instruction and make learning fun." throughout the school, revising the Acceptable Use Policy, along with figuring out the best way to sign out the iPads once all the applications have been installed. Plus, the best way to securely store the iPad and keep it charged and synced needed to be devised. Teaching the staff how to use the iPad was another key component of the integration, said Mrs. Jennifer Trowbridge, the school's computer coordinator and PK-12 computer teacher.

In addition to incorporating the Common Core Learning


Dignity for All Students Act

The goal of the Dignity for All Students Act (DASA), which took effect July 1, 2012, is to provide students with a school environment free of discrimination and harassment by peers and by school personnel.

DASA requires school districts to develop a policy that prohibits harassment, bullying, and discrimination and adds awareness to actual or perceived race, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sex, sexual orientation, and gender.

The goal of the DASA is to create a safe and supportive school climate where students can learn and focus in a welcoming considerate environment.
