For Cindy Ackerle, who has been the Class of 2009's class advisor since they were in seventh grade, this class could be described as dreamers and she wanted to share these words about daydreaming with them:

Mrs. Ackerle also described the graduating class as challenging and fun-loving. Some of her favorite memories of this class include a pen pal project when they were in seventh and eighth grades. Mrs. Ackerle said the students had pen pals with residents from the Countryside Adult Home, an assisted living facility. The students wrote letters and made cards for their pen pals and ended the project by spending half a day with the residents. "It was rewarding for all," commented Mrs. Ackerle.

This class also had a very unique prom, Mrs. Ackerle added. "In addition to the students taking ballroom dancing in preparation for the prom, they were the first class to hold an after-prom party. I was always surprised with the new things they were willing to try. They are all going to turn out fine in the future. The quieter kids are going to surprise everyone."

Retiring this year, Ted Caldwell, K-12 enrichment program coordinator; and Anne Greene and Mary Ann Ross, fourth grade teachers; all have fond memories of the students in the Class of 2009. One of the most memorable recollections for Ms. Ross was that this was the first class that went on local history trips with Mr. Caldwell when the students were in fourth grade.

Ms. Ross and Mrs. Greene said it was a good group of students. They worked hard as a group and got along well. Ms. Ross pointed out that there were three Dylans in the class when they were in fourth grade, that's when Dylan DiMauro took on the moniker of D.J. According to popular names for 1991, Dylan was 46th in the list. Another observation was there were a lot more boys in the class. To date, the class is comprised of 64 percent boys.

Mr. Caldwell recalls: "In mid September of 2002, I took the Class of 2009 to Raquette Lake for three days of canoeing and outdoor education. One canoe trip took us up the Marion River to the railroad carry that led to Utowanna Lake. About a mile from the carry we came upon a low beaver dam that blocked the river. Some of the canoes were able to power over the dam and continue on. One canoe, however, contained Officer McKinney in the stern and Mark Lemise in the bow. With Officer McKinney's encouragement Mark summoned up all of his strength, and they attempted to power the canoe over the dam. Other canoes approached the scene to find Mark sitting in the bow smiling and Officer McKinney in the stern looking forlorn. The dam had become the fulcrum of a canoe seesaw, and the cheering students were saying, "Officer McKinney, we 'dare' you to get out of the canoe.

"I have worked with the Class of 2009 for 13 years, and every year brought experiences such as Raquette Lake. The class has been a pleasure, and I have loved sharing my wisdom with such a unique group of young people."

According to a questionnaire given to members of the senior class to discover some of their favorite memories from their years at BCS, what they remember most include: field trips, sports, Senior Seminar, Board meetings, crew, The Spot, band trips and parades, Model U.N. trips, passing notes in class, lunch, prom, field trips, bake sales, driver's education, and basketball practices.

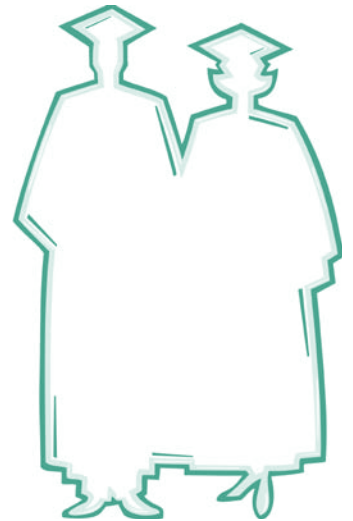
Amanda Moffit commented that some of her favorite memories are the crazy nicknames, jokes and random noises her class came up with.

Continuing to Assist Bolton Grads

Thirty more BCS alumni have received cash grants from the Bolton Scholarship Association for 2009. The Bolton Scholarship Association has now awarded a total of more than \$200,000 in financial assistance to former Bolton students enrolled in college.

The Bolton Scholarship Committee met in February and awarded 30 new scholarships to deserving alumni from Bolton Central School. The total amount disbursed this year was \$5,983. Originally established as a loan-giving group, the Scholarship Committee now grants the scholarships outright to deserving Bolton graduates. The Class of 2009 will be eligible to apply for scholarships when they complete their freshman year of college.

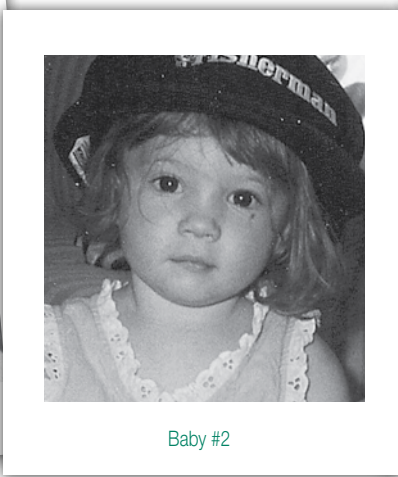
Students must submit a college transcript and have a G.P.A. of at least 2.50 to qualify. Awards are granted to students attending two-year and four year colleges and technical/trade schools.

The Bolton Scholarship Committee makes the grants from its endowment fund, and awards are based on the annual interest earned by this fund. This keeps the scholarship fund self-sustaining.

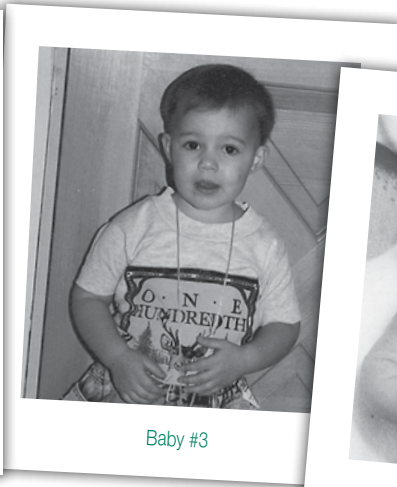

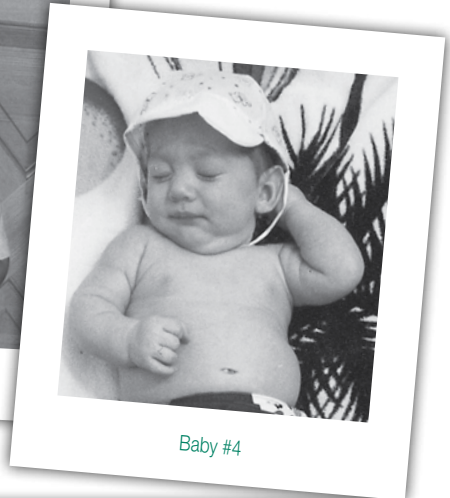

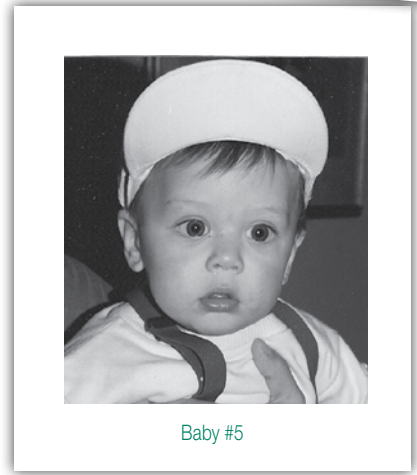

For the last 15 years, the Bolton Booster Club has awarded several scholarships to the athletes in our community.

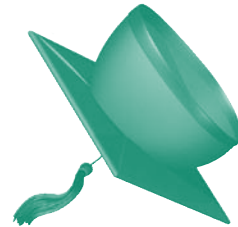

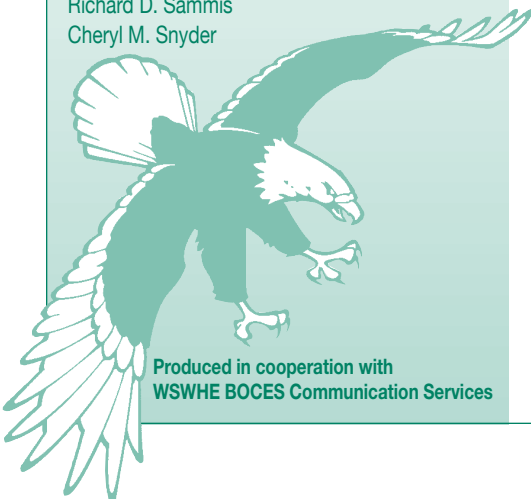
