involved and helped organize class activities.


As these young adults, known as Millenials or Gen Yers (people born between 1980 and 1995), prepare to go out into the world, what's in store for them? How will society change?



Gen Y will be the most significant consumer sector for the media and entertainment industries, sited The Millenials Web site. The site also states, "Not only will they be

big; they will be fragmented and difficult to reach. The increasing number of media channels - instant messaging, email, social networks, chat rooms, iPods, mobile phones, MP3 Players, P2P networks, handheld devices, digital video recorders, video games, game consoles and next generation communities and devices through which this generation communicates and consumes media and entertainment, makes them a highly elusive target for businesses hoping to reach them."

## Alumni Receive Scholarships, Too

Scholarship Association provides awards to former Bolton students who are enrolled in college.

In addition to the Booster Club Scholarships and the Senior Awards, which are awarded to Bolton students when they graduate, Bolton students have the opportunity to receive cash grants from the Bolton Scholarship Association after they graduate and go on to college.

The Bolton Scholarship Committee met in February and awarded 23 new scholarships to deserving alumni from Bolton Central School. The total amount disbursed this year was \$4,466.72. Originally established as a loan-giving group, the Scholarship Committee now grants the scholarships outright to deserving Bolton graduates. The Class of 2010 will be eligible to apply for scholarships when they complete their first semester of college.

Students must submit a college transcript and have a G.P.A. of at least 2.50 to qualify. Awards are granted to students attending two-year and four year colleges and technical/trade schools.

The Bolton Scholarship Committee makes the grants from its endowment fund, and awards are based on the annual interest earned by this fund. This keeps the scholarship fund self-sustaining.




## **Booster Club Scholarships**
